Why you should participate:

Tanzania is a home to vast coastal marine fisheries resources and shared inland waters, which include the East Africa's great lakes (Lake Victoria, Tanganyika and Nyasa), which are facing social, economic and ecological challenges.

IIFET 2012 Tanzania will offer a unique opportunity to fisheries economists, fisheries managers, fishing industry members, NGOs and other actors in the fishing sector to explore topical issues in fisheries in an appropriate setting.

It will also be an occasion to network with international, regional and national researchers and other actors, explore new areas of collaboration and exchange ideas on the economics of fisheries management, development of the fishery and aquaculture sectors, seafood markets and trade and other related topics.

Expected Audience:

IIFET 2012 Tanzania seeks to bring together academia, business and industry, nonprofit organizations, fishing communities, and others to exchange ideas and solutions to global marine and seafood problems. In addition this conference aims at convening a special session for policy makers to discuss policy issues relevant for Tanzania and the region at large.
